

The Board and Committee wishes to thank the mayor and city officials for their support and cooperation.





Washington County Italian Heritage Festival Salutes Don Bellisario

Donald P. Bellisario, the prolific writer/creator/executive producer, is proud of his Pennsylvania coalmining country roots, and his Italian heritage.

A native of Charleroi, he grew up in nearby Cokeburg, where his father, Albert J. Bellisario, owned "Al's Place", a local tavern. His mother, Dana, who is Yugoslavian, now resides in Upper St. Clair.

To date, Don Bellisario is most familiar to us as the creator of the CBS-TV series "Magnum, P.I." and "Airwolf", as well as "Tales of the Gold Monkey" for ABC-TV. He is currently in pre-production on his first screenplay written directly for motion picture theatrical release, at Tri-Star, where he is also developing a TV series.

In addition to acting as Executive Producer and writing the 2-hour opening episode, Bellisario also directed the initial "Airwolf", which Universal Pictures released as a foreign feature.

His writing expertise stems from Penn State, where he majored in journalism, interrupting his college career for a four-year stint in the Marines, during which he turned down an appointment to West Point. After separating from the Corps, he returned to school for his BA degree and then went to work

for a local newspaper. When he switched to advertising, he began a career that lasted fifteen years and culminated as the Creative Director and Senior Vice President of The Bloom Agency in Dallas, Texas.

Deciding it was time to move on, creatively. Bellisario relocated in Hollywood, where he directed television commercials. He then wrote a screenplay on speculation, and met Stephen Cannell, who was producing such series as "The Rockford Files" and "Baa Baa Black Sheep". He was hired as story editor for the latter and after five shows, was named producer of the series. This led to Supervising Producer for "Battlestar Galactica". He also contributed scripts to such series as "Kojak", "Switch", "Big Hawaii", "Delvecchio", "Quincy", as well as "Baa Baa Black Sheep" and "Battlestar Galactica".

Bellisario then created "Magnum, P.I." and became its Executive Producer when the two-hour pilot was sold as a series to CBS-TV.

On June 30, 1984, Bellisario wed actress/writer Deborah Pratt at the Catholic Church of St. Charles Borromeo in North Hollywood, California. Deborah is the daughter of Colonel and Mrs. Bertram Pratt, U.S. Army (ret.) from Chicago, Illinois. In addition to her other talents, she is also an accredited songwriter/singer and a graduate of Webster University (psychology) in St. Louis. The couple welcomed

their first child, a girl, Troian Avery, on October 28, 1985.

Bellisario has four grown children; David is an Associate Producer on the "Magnum, P.I." series; Joy lives in Texas; daughter Leslie is a graduate of St. Johns in Annapolis, Md.; Julie recently graduated from Grinnell University in Iowa. His six year old son, Michael Angelo, is, his proud father asserts, "under option to Penn State".

Bellisario, under his company banner Belisarius Productions, in association with Universal Studios where he wrote and produced his TV series, was headquartered in what was formerly Alfred Hitchcock's bungalow.

His hobbies, when he can find the time, encompass helicopter flying, running and golf.



The Statue of Liberty


Being a member of the new generation, I have heard stories of the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island. I have been told how the immigrants came to America to find freedom and new opportunities.

1985 Columbus Day Honorees

The above men were honorees by the Washington Co. Italian Festival Committee at a Columbus Day Dinner Dance on Sunday, October 27, 1985.

The honorees were Louis S. Falbo, Executive Director of the Greater Washington Chamber of Commerce; Guy V. Montecalvo, Washington High School teacher and football coach, and Vincent DiBello, a teacher at Immaculate Conception High School.

Mr. Falbo, a resident of Monessen, was the 125 lb. WPIAL wrestling champion in 1941 and runnerup to the state champion. However, Mr. Falbo was honored for his efforts in bringing about the first Italian festival in 1982.

Guy Montecalvo was a track star at Wash High and established a WPIAL record in 220-yard dash. He has been head football coach at his alma mater since 1980. His teams have won Century Conference championships and have been in the playoffs.

Vincent DiBello, a native of Aquara, Salerno, Italy, came to the United States in 1920. He graduated from Washington High School in 1928 and received a B.S. degree from Washington and Jefferson College in 1932, and a masters degree in 1935. Mr. DiBello taught mathematics at Washington High School for 31 years and in 1971 joined the faculty at Immaculate Conception.

Mr. DiBello taught at the Washington Seminary and conducted government education classes at W&J. He was very helpful to his fellow Italians as he taught them English to prepare them for citizenship papers, read and interpreted letters, and helped them with tax returns.

Mr. DiBello is fondly remembered by his former students, who express great admiration for him; he receives letters from them telling him how their lives have been influenced by him and his teaching ability.

At the Columbus Day Dinner, Rep. David A. Sweet, presented Mr. DiBello a plaque in recognition of his many years of service in the teaching profession.

When considering the Mediterranean diet it should never be forgotten, at least as far as Italy is concerned, that coffee is among its staple foods, along with bread, pasta and wine. This doesn't mean that Italians drink inordinate amounts of coffee. In fact, in comparison with other nations their consumption is very modest.

In Italy, everyone drinks it, even the children, who have it with milk for breakfast. The difference is that, unlike other people, the Italians don't have the habit of drinking coffee with their meals, when they prefer wine. Instead, they drink it as a special treat, as something to be enjoyed on its own, either to finish off a good meal or to make a pleasant break in the working day.

ANGELO'S RISTORANTE

Buona Fortuna to the 5th Annual Italian Heritage Festival from the Passalacqua family and the staff of Angelo's, Washington's Original Italian Restaurant.

955 West Chestnut Street Washington, PA 222-7120

In March of 1939, Angelo and Giacomina Passalacqua opened a small neighborhood tavern at 955 West Chestnut St. With Rt. 40 being a major highway at the time, the place became popular for travelers and area workers. As more and more people frequented the tavern, Angelo and Jenny (English for Giacomina) began serving Italian spaghetti and fresh bread, so, fittingly, the tavern became known as the West Chestnut Spaghetti Inn. As they slowly leaned more towards a restaurant than a tavern, Angelo added a separate dinning room to accommodate their customers with good food and friendly service.

Angelo passed away in 1953 and Jenny ran the business with her children helping her. In 1957 the business was turned over to her son, Silvio, and her daughter, Carmellina De Stefano. Together they ran the business for 27 years. During those years they changed the name to Angelo's, in memory of their father, and Angelo's became the most popular restaurant in town with the restaurant growing every year.

In 1981 Silvio became the sole proprietor and two of his three children joined the business to become the third generation of Passalacquas to operate Angelo's Restaurant.

So, nowadays when you stop by Angelo's, you'll be greeted by Silvio and his wife Patty, his son Michael or his daughter Tonne. And since 1981 the restaurant has taken on many changes in personality as well. In addition to traditional Italian foods, Angelo's now serves Cajun style dishes, imaginative veal and delectable seafoods, along with modern cuisine of all types. Angelo's boasts 25 wines by the glass and a dessert tray filled with homemade pastries.

The Passalacqua family has directly operated the restaurant in the same location for 47 years and while the food and atmosphere have changed, some things have never changed. It's still a family business and it's still run the same as when Angelo and Jenny first opened the doors, with good food and friendly service, and the Passalacqua family plans to keep it that way, after all, it's a family tradition.

Gone With The Wine: A Tasteful Production

Well, it's October and the kids are thinking of Halloween and I'm thinking of making wine. This year my children are old enough to help with the winemaking process. They were very excited to participate ever since they watched an old "I Love Lucy" rerun where Lucy is running around inside a barrel

stomping grapes with her bare feet. I told them that clean feet weren't a prerequisite in preparing the grapes for the wine that we're going to make. They're a little disappointed but that's technology for you. We all got into the car for the drive to the Strip District in Pittsburgh to select our main character in our production - crates of grapes. After selecting the grapes, we head for home. On our way home, I explain to the children about the fascinating chemical properties of the grape. A grape left alone could make wine if its skin were broken. Fermentation (where sugar is transformed into alcohol)

comes naturally to grapes. In the final stages of ripening, yeast cells appear on the skin of the grape and cling to it. As soon as the skin is broken (Lucy stomping and crushing grapes, kids), the yeast cells pounce on the sugar in its own juice and turn it into alcohol. Only a grape has enough sugar for this to happen naturally. The way the grapes are broken, and the container they ferment in are two of the most variable things about wine. Since we are making wine on a small scale, we will use a wine press to break the grapes. The juice from the smashed grapes flows into an oak barrel where it is left to ferment. What's left on the press is called "must" (the children laugh since it sounds very similar to their last name). This "must" is also pressed for any remaining juice. Now, the wine matures in the barrel. A certain amount of oxygen permeates the wood of the barrel. and this causes the wine to grow. Then, it is ready for bottling.

When a wine is bottled, it has time to take in oxygen from the air on its way from the barrel to the bottle. Once in the bottle, the air supply is short; but it exists. The

wine lives and grows in the bottle on the oxygen dissolved in it, and what it can get through the cork. Only in the bottle can it reach maturity. The bottles should be of a dark or green color and stored usually in a place where the temperature stays constant, such as a cellar. Finally, wine must be kept lying down. All wine bottles which are going to be kept for longer than a week or two should stay horizontal. The reasoning behind this is that it keeps the cork wet which prevents shrinking and letting the air in. So, kids, do you have any questions? Kids? Oh, so I've put them to sleep. It couldn't have been my talking. It must have been the long drive home from Pittsburgh. Just when I was getting to the best part about what it really takes to make a great white wine - the winemaker with imagination and skill who goes well beyond the book in his understanding of his craft and his ability to improve on what nature has given him. There are many methods to produce a white wine. That remains, as it has always been, an art rather than a science. Alle Salute! Kids we're home!

Anthony (Tony) Ruffa, of Washington, Pa., was known to his Duke University teammates, where he starred in football 1938-39 and the 40's as "True Toe Tony".

Anthony Ruffa broke into prominence because of his ability at placements. It was Tony's field goal in the 1939 Rose Bowl game that sent Duke ahead until the final 40 seconds of play when Southern California rallied to a win 7 to 3.

Besides playing in the Rose Bowl, he played in the East-West Charity All Star Game and the College All-Star game, and was named to the All-Italian Team, All American team and All-Southern team.

Anthony graduated from Washington High School in 1936 where he was an all WPIAL; he also played baseball in high school.

While in the U.S. Army, entered in 1941, he played football for the Army Western All Star Team, which raised over one-million for army relief. He also played, coached and helped organize a football program in the Phillipines.

After his army service, Anthony Ruffa played for a short time with the Green Bay Packers and the Norfolk Shamrocks.



A Real Family Business

Al's Upholstery Shop Keeps Three Generations At Work

Al and Louise Lucarelli have learned a lot about operating a family business in the last 56 years. In their case, the family business is a real family business.

They have four sons, and several of their sons' sons working at Al's Upholstery, Inc., on Monroe Street. Al Lucarelli turned 90 recently, and he still works every day.

The Lucarellis have also learned a lot about keeping a family together. On any given day, a dozen Lucarellis gather around a marble table in the workroom of the upholstery shop to enjoy Mrs. Lucarelli's cooking.

One lunch last week included cold cuts and pasta e fagioli, a mixture of tubular pasta and beans. The tablecloth, befitting the work location, was a collection of pages from The Blade.

And the Lucarellis have learned a lot about minding the store. In fact, they have always lived above the shop — when it was on Summit Street many years ago and on Monroe Street for the last 32 years.

Living above the store is not all bad.

"I love to be upstairs like this," Mrs. Lucarelli said. "I want the smell of furniture on me upstairs and down."

Mr. and Mrs. Lucarelli live in a sumptuously furnished large apartment that includes furniture built by their oldest son, Bob.

They have a 40-by-40 foot rumpus room, a rooftop terrace, a circular bed in their huge master bedroom, a walk-in cedar closet.

"If I had to have it done, it would have cost a fortune," Mrs. Lucarelli said.

"I'm proud of this building, because everything is original. The whole building is custom-made."

Al Lucarelli came to the United States from Italy in 1920 and started his upholstery shop 10 years later, just after the stockmarket crash.

The Lucarellis recall selling foot stools for 50 cents apiece just to

keep the doors open. The problem was, nobody had the 50 cents, Mrs. Lucarelli says.

Mr. Lucarelli could have lost his business in 1938, when he and his wife visited Italy.

He was not yet a United States citizen, and he was stopped by the Italian authorities and told that he was a "soldier of Mussolini."

Mrs. Lucarelli stood up and told them that her husband had a business and children in the United States. An understanding official allowed them to board the ship for home.

The Lucarellis have made family trips a tradition. In 1974, 43 of them went to New York for a reunion, and two years later 17 family members traveled to Italy.

Last year, the Lucarellis sent their children and spouses on a cruise to Mexico.

The Lucarellis also recall working till 9 at night for more than 20 years on Summit Street and for at least 10 years after they moved out on Monroe Street in the 1950s.

One advantage of keeping the children in the business is a reduction in the workload for the Lucarellis. But there is no retirement planned, they say.

"I open up shop every day, and I close every day," Mr. Lucarelli said.

The years have taken their toll, though.

Mrs. Lucarelli, who calls herself "Mama," said, "Look at my man's fingers." His fingers are permanently bent from years of shearing heavy fabric.

When her husband turned 90, Mrs. Lucarelli had the task of telling everyone what to get him for his birthday.

What do you buy a 90-year-old working man for his birthday? It's simple, said Mrs. Lucarelli. "Cigarette, booze, and nuts."

Angelo Sciacca, a shoe repairman, has been in the trade since he was a junior in high school. When Angelo started as a shoe repairman, there were 14 shops; he is the only shoe repairman left in the area, and is experienced in all phases of leather work, in addition to repairing shoes.

Mario Sciacca, a barber, has been in the trade since he was a junior in high school. He started as an apprentice just two doors from where Angelo was learning the shoe repair business. Mario was the first barber in the Charleroi area to pass the state barber examination when the law became effective in 1936.
